Publish a cross UK article on homelessness. Article will bring together existing data sources to present comparability, coherence, and assess any data limitations. A cross UK homelessness statistics article was published on 17 September alongside an article about improvements to statistics across the GSS and an interactive tool .
<p>The Experimental Statistical Framework for Housing & Planning Statistics illustrates how we are measuring the housing and planning landscape across the UK.</p> <p>Make the current Experimental Statistical Framework interactive, taking on board user feedback in development.</p> <p>Continue to refine the content of the Experimental Statistical Framework and use it to assist in identification of priority topics for further improvement / coherence.</p>	Throughout 2019	Tony Wilkins (ONS)	<p>Initial work complete. Further work ongoing.</p> <p>On 25 February we published an interactive framework for housing and planning statistics. The tool combines the topics from the experimental statistical framework with the information contained in the Spreadsheet statistical guide.</p> <p>We have incorporated feedback from user events² into the statistical framework.</p> <p>We have refined the tool following user feedback and lessons learnt from the publication of the homelessness interactive tool have been incorporated into the housing tool. But we will continue to refine and update the tool.</p>

Further work ongoing.</p> <p>The Centre for Homelessness Impact (CHI) have held various user engagement events across the UK and a consultation to help inform the development of their SHARE framework.</p> <p>A response to the consultation was published on 2 October.</p> <p>The interactive SHARE platform alongside a report was published on 13 February 2020. This will continue to be updated throughout 2020.</p>

Improve the measurement and understanding of Homelessness and Rough Sleepers, taking into account the country specific requirements relating to legislation / policy.	Ongoing	Tony Wilkins (ONS)	<p>Work ongoing.</p> <p>We are investigating how to improve our understanding of homelessness and rough sleepers, including data-linking projects across the UK.</p> <p>ONS, with input from other departments/DAs, published an article on 17 September summarising the planned improvements to homelessness statistics across the GSS.</p>
Use H-CLIC data in England to improve the evidence base for homelessness to aid and improve understanding of how households and individuals cycle in and out of homelessness over time and across the country.	Throughout 2019/20 and onwards	Lan-Ho Man (MHCLG) and Diana Airimitoiaie (ADRUUK)	<p>Work ongoing.</p> <p>Administrative Data Research UK, with ONS as a core partner, has a funded research and data infrastructure to create new linked cross-government data sets for research purposes.</p> <p>This project aims to link H-CLIC data from the Local Authorities in England, and is also hoping to link the H-CLIC data to other data sources such as homelessness evaluations run within MHCLG. This project is in early stages, with MHCLG leading the work and ONS as a trusted third party.</p>

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Expand coverage and quality of case level homelessness data in England.	Ongoing	Danielle Ryan (MHCLG)	<p>Work ongoing. Following the first release of homelessness estimates for England based on H-CLIC data, MHCLG plan to expand coverage and quality of statistics to meet user needs.</p> <p>The first full year of statistics using H-CLIC data was published on 12 September 2019.</p>
Carry out an ongoing homelessness and rough sleeping research and evaluation programme in England.	Ongoing	MHCLG	<p>Work ongoing. MHCLG have an ongoing programme of work for evaluation and research around homelessness statistics in England. This includes a project to explore homelessness and rough sleeping among LGBT people, and a project producing evidence-based advice on how to prevent homelessness among prison-leavers.</p>
Explore the feasibility of introducing case level homelessness data in Wales.	Ongoing	Sue Leake (WG)	<p>Work ongoing. The Welsh Government and the Collaborative Centre for Housing evidence (CaCHE) jointly funded a feasibility study into the collection of case level homelessness data in Wales. A report is due to be published in Spring 2020.</p>
Expand published statistics for homelessness in Northern Ireland.	Ongoing	James Sampson (DfC NI)	<p>Work ongoing. DfC continue to work alongside NI Housing Executive to continue to develop their standalone biannual homelessness statistics publication. The third edition of this report is due to be released in March 2020. As with the first two editions it will be labelled as experimental statistics; this will also allow the time series within the report to build and will give a greater opportunity to assess the process of data and contextual information collation.</p>

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Continue to publish and improve statistics on the deaths of homeless people in England and Wales.	Ongoing	Ben Windsor-Shellard (ONS)	<p>Work ongoing. Statistics on the deaths of homeless people in England and Wales were published by ONS for the first time in December 2018 as Experimental Statistics. On 1 October 2019 ONS released data for 2018 to update analysis on deaths of homeless people.</p> <p>ONS has been working with local authorities, academics and the General Register Office (GRO) to improve the accuracy of these statistics, particularly for smaller geographical areas where there is user demand.</p>
Improve rough sleeping statistics and explore the potential for reporting on deaths of people experiencing homelessness in Scotland.	Ongoing	Adam Krawczyk (SG)/ Julie Ramsey (National Records of Scotland)	<p>Work ongoing. Scottish Government are looking at options to supplement case-level statistics with a new rough sleeping data collection system. The system will improve estimates and facilitate joined up working across organisations helping those sleeping rough (in partnership with Centre for Homelessness Impact).</p> <p>Scottish Government are also exploring research into the public perceptions of homelessness.</p> <p>To meet user demand, on 5 February, National Records of Scotland published new statistics measuring deaths of people experiencing homelessness in Scotland, 2017 and 2018.</p>
Improving Harmonisation			
Collaborate with MHCLG and the Devolved Administrations to produce a Homelessness conceptual framework and improved guidance on the comparability of homelessness statistics	Autumn 2019	Sean Mattson (ONS)	<p>Complete. The beta version of a homelessness interactive tool was published on 17 September 2019. The tool provides comparison guidance, outlines the process a person may go through when seeking support for housing in each UK country,</p>

Identify the key analytical questions around homelessness and rough sleeping in the UK, and where that requires coordinated working across the four nations. Consider how data can be collated to answer those questions including to improve UK comparability.	Ongoing	<p>Debra Prestwood (ONS)</p> <p>All statistical producers</p>	<p>Work ongoing.</p> <p>Key questions from users continue to be identified through user engagement and horizon scanning.</p> <p>Consideration is being given to how the barriers to harmonisation that the GSS Harmonisation Report identified could be overcome, including an assessment of the costs and resources associated with providing users with information on the size of the differences, or guidance on how to make adjustments to obtain comparable estimates.</p> <p>Following publication of the Cross UK homelessness article and interactive tool, age group categories and reasons for homelessness are being investigated to better understand the barriers to coherence.</p> <p>In 2020/21 optimal use of data and data linkage opportunities will continue to be explored.</p>

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Improving Accessibility to Data

On 25 February we published an interactive framework for housing and planning statistics. Building upon open data initiatives in the four countries, develop a data repository for housing and planning data. The Connected Open Government Statistics (COGS) project (formerly the GSS Data Project) is looking to accelerate the rate of uptake of new housing data families.</p> <p>Dwelling by tenure, the pilot dataset, was incorporated in April 2019, and affordable housing and homelessness are the next two data families to be added.</p>

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Improving User Engagement			
<p>Focus on the user perspective of these statistics to increase their public value. Continue to consult policy and non-Government users on demand for comparable data across the UK. This sets out how we will engage with our users and provide a reference point for statistical producers to help shape their own user engagement work.</p>
<p>Conduct user engagement survey to better understand the needs of users of these statistics.</p>	May 2019	Nick Woodhill (ONS)	<p>Complete.</p> <p>A user engagement survey was run during May 2019 to collect views on the work statisticians are doing to improve the quality and value of these statistics. Responses were analysed, and initial results have been circulated and presented at the Steering Group meeting and with Working Group members.</p> <p>Results from the survey were shared with statistics producers and on a GSS Blog.</p> <p>We will use this feedback to help prioritise the work we do in the future.</p>
